Bringing Back Scrip: How You Can Shop Like Normal and Help Out the Chapter

A couple years ago the Lansing Jaycees ran a fundraiser called "Shop with Scrip," which is a way you can purchase gift cards at no extra cost and a percentage of your purchase benefits a designated charity. The Chapter has a Scrip account, which means you can purchase gift cards for special occasions or normal, run of the mill everyday purchases you make.

Various retailers approve being part of the program and agree to give a certain percentage to charities. For example, say that like me, you purchase all of your gas from Speedway. Well, you can buy gift cards totaling either \$25 or \$100 and the Jaycees would get 4 percent of your purchase, but your gift card is for the full amount. Do all of your grocery shopping at Meijer? Good news, Meijer offers gift cards and kicks back 3 percent to charities.

Visualizing the Chapter

The pretty picture accompanying this article (bottom left) is a network graph. A network graph connects nodes (in this case people) by edges (in this case, the relationship is that they attended one or more events in common). Graphs like this are an object studied in discrete mathematics and computer science among other fields.

The picture shows that several people have been to events in common with a number of different people. It also shows that several people have been to no events this year. Part of this is due to incomplete data, but several people also in actuality have not been to an event this year. As the weather warms up, it would be great to see more people having a good time.

How is the data structured? I'm glad you asked. Let's suppose we have four people and two events. The first person attend the first event, but not the second. The second person attends both. The third person attends only the second. The fourth person attends none. We can represent this using a matrix, where each row is for people and each column is for events:

If we multiply this incidence matrix by the transpose of the incidence matrix, we will get a 4x4 co-occurrence matrix, which shows that person 1 attended an event in common with just person 1 and no one else. You can see that person 2 attended events with person 1 and person 3. I then was able to take the co-occurrence or adjacency matrix and put it into a format called Pajek .mat file that was read into the Sci2 tool and visualized using GUESS.

I plan on bringing more visuals of the chapter to the chapter.

Why you should know Gordy Klatt

Dr. Gordy Klatt is the "father" of Relay For Life. As a colorectal surgeon in Tacoma, Washington, Gordy wanted to make a difference at his local American Cancer Society. He looked to what he loved for inspiration: running.

In 1985, Gordy ran 83 miles in 24 hours and raised \$27,000 for the American Cancer Society (ACS). Friends and family donated money for the pleasure of running or walking a few laps with him and to support the great work that ACS does. That night, Gordy could not have known that he would inspire others to do the same in their towns and that the Relay For Life event would grow into the largest fundraising event in the world. The events take place in 5,200 communities nationwide and 20 countries each year, bringing in about \$400 million a year to help fight cancer! All of this is because of one man's creative idea to do something good.

Gordy is a hero to so many and now he is not just fighting cancer for his patients, friends, and neighbors. He is now battling for his own fight against



cancer. Gordy was diagnosed with stomach cancer in 2012 and he is still active with ACS. Let's honor Gordy this year, and all of those we know who are battling cancer, by exceeding our goal of \$7,500. We have already raised \$1,058! We can do this!

What will be your Gordy Klatt moment? We are always in need of creative fundraising ideas that we can use for fundraising up until the event on June 27 and 28 and beyond! Although we would love to surpass our goal at Relay, we have until August to submit any funds raised. Every little bit adds up, so don't think that your idea for a fundraiser won't raise enough money. Don't worry if you can't come up with a fundraiser idea either.
