Community Issues - The Energy Crisis

Michigan has serious energy vulnerability, according to Martin Kushler, Ph.D. Director for the American Council for An Energy-Efficient Economy. In 2002 the average household nationally spent about \$3,000 on energy. In pre-Kartina 2005, the amount was up to \$4,600 per year, an increase of over 50 percent, or \$1,600 taken out of every household's annual disposable income. What does this mean to Michigan residents? Well, jobs for one. Money we spend on energy doesn't stay in our state. In fact, according to Kushler, the additional \$6 billion annual drain on Michigan's economy is roughly equivalent to the lost payroll from closing 60 Greenville Ectrolux manufacturing plants. "If we could all do our part in conserving energy, even just 1 percent of energy savings of the \$20 billion that we spend. That means that \$200 million stays in the state," David Gard of the Michigan Environmental Council said.

So how can Jaycees help this community issue?

- ° Hold an Energy Efficient Day in the community to educate the public about the many ways they can save energy or pass out information at your next meeting. Check out the resources at www.michigan.gov/energyoffice or at www.urbanoptions.org.
- ° There are eight Michigan Energy Demonstration Centers that are non-profit that educate the public through hands-on, interactive examples. They provide an opportunity for Michigan residents to be at the forefront of using energy effectively. Contact them to volunteer by finding the center nearest you at www.warmtraining.org/medc.
- ° Encourage your corporation to hold a regional workshop for managers to increase energy efficiency in public buildings. (Financial assistance available through the State of Michigan. For more information contact Brandy Minikey at (517) 241-8235 or bjminik@michigan.gov.)
- ° Ask your fellow Jaycees to implement the five strategies for "Pay It Forward Energy Savings." More information at <http://www.miipl.org/pdf/5STEPSSnyder.pdf>.
- ° Start an energy efficient group where group buying power can reduce the cost of energy efficient building materials and/or supplies. For example, the Michigan Interfaith Power and Light is a coalition of over 100 congregations across the State of Michigan whose mission is to involve communities of faith as stewards of God's creation by promoting and implementing energy conservation, energy efficiency, renewable energy and related sustainable practices. - ° Volunteer for your local Sierra Club, www.sierraclub.org, or other environmental group.
- ° Teach our kids about saving energy. Explore curriculum options at National Energy Education Demonstration Project. More information at www.need.org or www.michigan.gov/deq-meecs.
- ° Join or start an environment action council to help people translate their concern into positive action. Check out the West Michigan Environmental Action Council at www.wmeac.org for ideas or the Mid Michigan Environmental Action Council that runs a Smart Commute Campaign at <http://www.midmeac.org>.

Pop Tabs Produce More Than Fizz!



To many, a pop tab is just a piece of aluminum with one purpose - to open a can. But to the Ronald McDonald House, the pop tab is a valuable resource. Why? Collected pop tabs are recycled; generating much-needed funds to support the House and the families served each year. Money generated through recycling pop tabs helps play an important role in keeping their doors open. Just pop off those tabs from your soda cans, vegetable and soup cans, pet food cans, special diet food, etc. Save them in any container.

Bring them to the General Membership Meeting.

Why pop tabs and not the whole can? Pop tabs are high quality, pure aluminum and are more valuable than the can, which is a combination of aluminum and other alloys. Tabs are also easier to store and less messy than saving the whole can. We also recognize that other organizations use aluminum recycling as a way to raise money. All we want is the tab, so you can continue donating to more than one organization through your recycling.

The pop tab was invented by Mr. Ermal Fraze in Kettering, Ohio.

School counselors are asked to call the YDC with candidates who meet the following criteria:

- Failing, at-risk of failing, or at-risk of dropping out of school. Indicators include: poor grades and attendance current or past, incarcerated parent or sibling, parent or sibling that has dropped out of or has not completed high school, living at or below the poverty level, single head of household families, distressed home life
- No known gang affiliation, drug history, known felonious activity, or use of a weapon
- Between the ages of 10-15

We need you. Tutors/Mentors are needed today! Kids are waiting! Think about the gift you could give by passing along what you know to a younger, less fortunate youth. Male mentors are especially needed.
